

About the Regional Transportation Planning Office (RTPO)


The RTPO is an <u>umbrella organization</u> that provides technical and administrative staff for the:



2023 Project Highlights

Multimodal Transportation and Mitigation Options Fund (MMOF) Selected Projects

The RTPO selects projects to receive State and/or Federal funding from MMOF, which promotes a "complete and integrated multimodal system." After a call for projects in Fall 2022, the MMOF selection committee chose to fund the five project applications.

Grand Valley Transit Onboard Survey, Counts, and Analysis

Transit agencies typically conduct periodic onboard surveys in order to better understand ridership. This is usually done every 2-5 years, however Grand Valley Transit (GVT) had not conducted an onboard survey since 2014. Not only was GVT overdue for an update, but considering the significant change in ridership due to the COVID-19 pandemic it seemed especially important to have a fresh understanding of ridership. The onboard survey collects information about individual riders, how they use GVT, and how they feel about current services. Rider input will help shape future analysis.



In addition to the onboard rider survey, an online community survey was also conducted. This community survey was open to both riders and non-riders in an effort to understand how the wider community perceived GVT and to collect their feedback.

Grand Valley Transit Maintenance Facility




D2C Architects, Inc. led the project design and Buildings by Design was awarded the Construction Management/General Contractor (CM/GC) contract


A new transit fleet maintenance facility has been in discussions for several years as the GVT fleet has outgrown the available space in the City of Grand Junction Fleet Facility; impacting GVT operations and maintenance. In 2023, design work began for a 19,400 SF pre-engineered metal building to be built at 2553 Riverside Parkway in Grand Junction. The new transit fleet maintenance facility will include eight bus bays, a wash bay, an office, parts storage, and a farebox repair room.

Project construction is expected to start in Summer 2024. The project is estimated to cost around \$7.5M, using both federal and state funds.


State of Transportation
