## 2022 SUICIDE REPORT

#### **DEFINITIONS**

**Suicide Death** is a death caused by injuring oneself with the intent to die.

**Suicide Attempt** when someone harms themselves with any intent to end their life, but they do not die as a result of their actions.

**Suicidal Ideation,** also known as suicidal thought, is thinking about, considering, or planning suicide. It can range from a passing thought to detailed planning.

#### **RISK FACTORS**

Previous suicide attempts, history of mental disorders (e.g. clinical depression), isolation, easy access to lethal methods, and history of alcohol or substance abuse.



# THE SUICIDE DEATH RATE IN MESA COUNTY REMAINS HIGHER THAN BOTH THE STATE OF COLORADO AND THE UNITED STATES.

#### **LIFE STRESSORS**

The top life stressors experienced prior to death were drug/alcohol misuse, relationship, and physical health.

#### **MEANS**

Firearms are responsible for half of suicide deaths in Mesa County.

#### **AGE**

The highest rate of suicide death was observed among working-age adults. Meanwhile, the highest rate of hospital visits for a suicide attempt/ideation was observed among youth and young adults.

#### **SUBSTANCE USE**

Drugs or alcohol were involved at the time of death in nearly 75% of suicide deaths.





RATE OF SUICIDE DEATH PER 100,000 IN MESA COUNTY, COLORADO, AND THE UNITED STATES (2009-2022)







## **DEATHS** BY SUICIDE





Those who die by suicide have often made previous attempts. In 2022, one in four people who died by suicide had a known previous attempt.






## **INSIGHTS**

Suicide rates are highest among working adults aged 25 to 64. In 2022, the majority of deaths by suicide were among adults aged 30 to 49, compared to only a third in 2021.

65% of people who died by suicide were experiencing 2 or more non-substance-related life stressors at the time of their death.

Substance Misuse and Finances as life stressors increased significantly from 2021 to 2022.


Substance misuse increased by 50%, and Financial stressors more than doubled.




The rate of suicide deaths in Mesa County has **increased over the last two years**, and is notably higher than the statewide rate.

## **INSIGHTS**

In Mesa County in 2022, suicide deaths were nearly 5 times more prevalent by population among men compared to women, at 69.5 per 100,000 compared to 14.5. Nationally, men die by suicide at four times the rate of women.

Though women are equally likely to attempt suicide in Mesa County, men are more likely to die by suicide. **This may be related to the more common methods used by men compared to women.** Across 2021 and 2022, over half of men (55%) used a firearm, compared to only 1 in 4 (25%) of women.

4% of those who died by suicide were Gay or Lesbian, and 4% were Transgender. These percentages may be underreported as this is reported by friends and family who may not have known or been ready to share this sensitive information.

Nationally, most suicide investigations do not collect sexual orientation or gender identity information, so there is little reliable data on how many gay and transgender people die by suicide in the United States. However, recent studies have shown that these communities are at a higher risk of suicide which reinforces the importance of asking about sexual identity. Going forward, we will be working to improve local data collection to better understand the impact of suicide on this community.




### **SUICIDE** ATTEMPTS & IDEATION

Data was collected on **suicide attempts and incidents of suicidal ideation resulting in an emergency department visit** in Mesa County during 2022. A majority of the data are based on ICD-10 primary diagnosis code.

St. Mary's Medical Center, Community Hospital, VA Western Colorado Health System, and Family Health West Hospital and Medical Center reported the data. Suicide risk at Mind Springs and West Springs Hospital is assessed differently.

## **INSIGHTS**

Youth/Young Adult hospital visits seem to have **stabilized after an increase in 2019 and 2020**. Working adult visits continue to trend upward, more than doubling in four years. Older adult visits were fairly stable but **began increasing in 2021 and 2022, nearly quadrupling in four years.** 

In 2022, a larger share of these visits were for ideation than in previous years, suggesting that either people are seeking care earlier in their crisis, or that more people are having ideation crises that rise to the intensity of visiting the hospital.

### **YOUTH RISK AND PROTECTIVE FACTORS**

When school personnel are concerned about a student, they make a referral to trained staff to complete a Suicide Risk Screener (SRS). This screener determines the level of intervention required and can initiate immediate safety planning. The number of referrals is related to staff awareness and concern about behaviors that may be warning signs of suicidal risk.





SOCIAL AND COMMUNITY CONTEXT

To effectively address each of these areas, we look at data and information, work through cross-sector partnerships, promote and **mobilize around topics of shared importance**, and ensure we have the right resources to achieve our collective goals.

Our suicide prevention work is an example of this approach in action. Current community efforts are focused in Social and Community Context, Health Care and Access, Education, and Economic Stability. The lead cross-sector partnership working on these important actions is the Mesa County Suicide Prevention Coalition.

HEALTH DOESN'T START IN THE DOCTOR'S OFFICE,



In Mesa County we work hard, we play hard, and we take care of each other. Yet not everyone has the same opportunities to make choices that allow them to live a long and healthy life. People in Mesa County lose time, money, and years of their life to preventable and treatable illnesses. Mesa County's foundation is strong in some ways and weak in others. When the foundation is weak, healthy choices feel out of reach as people struggle to meet basic needs.

#### SUICIDE PREVENTION IN ACTION



Grand Valley Connects is an enhanced resource navigation program that **assists community members with more complex needs.** 



Gun shops and pawn shops participate in Colorado's Gun Shop Project, **providing information about suicide risk and distributing gun locks to encourage safe storage** of firearms.



The Behavorial Health Steering Committee works to address gaps in our mental health care system.



Mesa County Opioid Response Group partners provide community trainings and substance abuse recovery support.



Veteran Programs in Mesa County foster connection and economic stability.



Mesa County Libraries **host events related to mental health, grief, resilience and more**, with partners such as HopeWest, Hilltop, and others.





#### CONNECTEDNESS


Feeling connected to other people, schools, neighborhoods, workplaces, faith communities, and cultural groups protects people from suicide risk.

The Mesa County Suicide Prevention Coalition supports school-based social and emotional learning programs, advises workplaces about policies that help people feel included and facilitates events and activities across the community.

Historically, little data has been effectively collected about gender identity and sexual orientation in Mesa County, making it difficult to understand the impact of suicide on the LGBT community. In 2022, reporting standards for suicide death changed to include more accurate information. One focus of LGBT support groups in Mesa County is education and training around having sensitive conversations to collect this information to ensure everyone in Mesa County receives care that matches their identity and physical needs.



#### **ACCESS TO SAFER CARE**

By implementing best practices for safer care, health care systems and organizations will see improvement in quality of patient care and reduction of suicide risk, attempts, and deaths for those within their system.

All three non-profit hospitals in Mesa County, St. Mary's, Community Hospital, and Family Health West, are working to implement the **Zero Suicide Program** to improve outcomes for patients experiencing suicidal crisis.

The hospitals are at different stages of implementation, but in 2022 their work focused on **improving staff training and streamlining systems** for effective screening, suicide care, and follow up.

VA Western Colorado is working on similar goals under their own suicide prevention program.

#### **POSTVENTION**

A loss of a loved one to suicide is a known risk factor for suicide death. **Postvention is the response to and care for individuals and communities affected by a suicide attempt, crisis, or death.** Examples include safe reporting and messaging about suicide by the media and affected organizations. It also includes caring follow up contacts after a suicide attempt or mental health crisis.

In 2022, the Mesa County Suicide Loss Coordinator supported valley residents who recently lost a loved one. She connected with family members impacted by suicide to make sure that their immediate needs were being met and worked with them as they navigated the logistical and emotional hurdles that came in the months following their loss.

In 2023, similar work is being done by the Family Support Coordinator.

#### **EDUCATION & AWARENESS**

The training and awareness levels of community members and medical providers protects people at risk of suicide by ensuring that when they need help, **they get it from knowledgeable and skillful people.**

**Training is available for free in Mesa County.** Options range from 1-2 hours in person or online or full-day in person training.




#### **ECONOMIC STABILITY**

Economic stability increases resilience and reduces financial stress - a risk factor for suicide. **Policies and practices for increased food security, affordable housing, family-friendly employment, and access to affordable, quality child care are suicide prevention efforts.**


An enhanced resource navigation program that assists community members with more complex needs.


The program was established by Mesa County Public Health in May 2022 and has received 600 referrals, with an average of 52 new referrals per month.

The top needs identified are counseling, housing, and mental health.

#### **LETHAL MEANS**

Access to lethal means describes the ability of a person experiencing a suicidal crisis to access the tools required to end their life. The Mesa County Suicide Prevention Coalition focuses on safe storage of firearms and appropriate storage and disposal of medications to reduce this risk.





# COLORADO NATIONAL COLLABORATIVE

The Colorado National Collaborative (CNC) is a partnership of professionals, organizations, and community members working on community-based strategies to prevent suicide in Colorado.

Mesa County is a proud participant in the CNC and is working towards the goal of reducing suicide by 20% by the year 2024.
